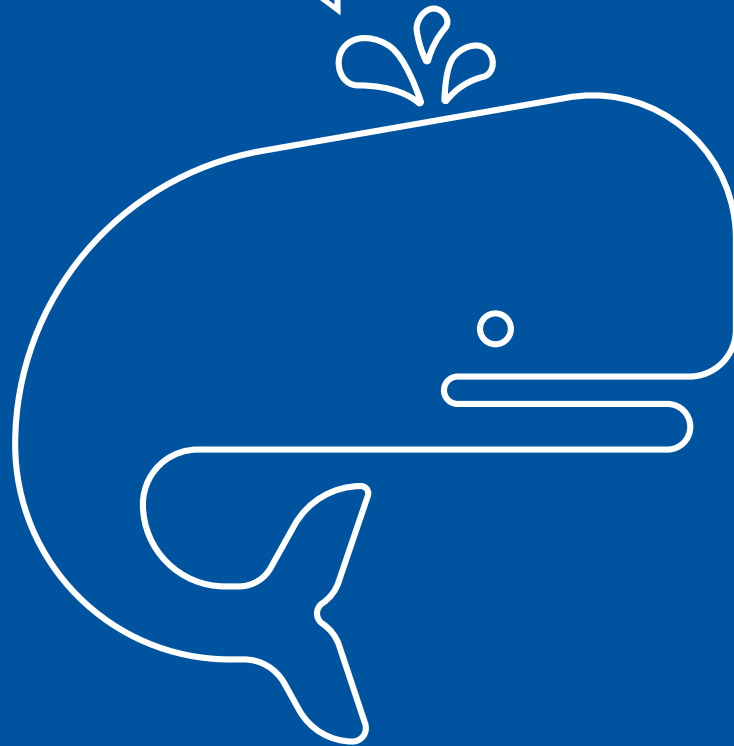

Wer sich selbst nicht dazu berufen fühlt, hat einmal im Jahr die Chance mit minimalem Aufwand mitzuwirken und mitzuentcheiden, was im kommenden Jahr auf der Agenda steht: Durchs Wählen!

Wie kann ich wählen? Die Wahlen finden dieses Jahr online statt: Am 10.06.2024 erhältst du per E-Mail einen Link zum Wahlportal. Melde dich dort mit deinem Benutzernamen (z.B. ab123456) und dem RWTH Single Sign-On Kennwort an. Der Link wird auch auf der Webseite des Wahlamtes veröffentlicht. Du kannst auch während der Öffnungszeiten an einem PC in der Abteilung 1.1 (1. OG, Karmeliterstraße 6, 52064 Aachen) wählen. Melde dich dazu telefonisch beim Wahlamt an. Die Stimmabgabe muss bis Freitag, den 21.06.2024 erfolgt sein. Alternativ kannst du auch per Briefwahl wählen (<https://asta.ac/wahl-brief>). Dazu muss dein Antrag auf Briefwahl bis Montag, den 03.06.2024 eingegangen sein.

Wen soll ich wählen? Dazu gibt es keine einfache Antwort. In dieser Wahlzeitung finden sich allerdings Vorstellungen (fast) aller zur Wahl stehenden Listen und Personen. Wen du davon wählst, bleibt dir überlassen. Wir können aber versichern, dass auch dieses Jahr wieder zahlreiche motivierte Studierende kandidieren.

The elections explained in 90 seconds!

Why should I vote? Because every year hundreds of students do voluntary work in order to improve your studies. If you like, you can join in at any time! If you don't, you still have the chance to cast your vote and decide upon which issues should be key in the next year.

How can I vote? The elections will take place online this year: On June 10, 2024, you will receive a link to the voting portal via email. Log in there with your username (e.g., ab123456) and the RWTH Single Sign-On password. The link will also be published on the Election Office's website. You can also vote at a PC in Department 1.1 (1st floor, Karmeliterstraße 6, 52064 Aachen) during office hours. To do this, contact the Election Office by phone. Votes must be cast by Friday, June 21, 2024. Alternatively, you can also vote by post (<https://asta.ac/wahl-brief>). Your application for postal voting must be received by Monday, June 3, 2024.

Who should I vote? There really is no simple answer here. In this 'Wahlzeitung' you can find information about almost all candidates and groups which are up for election. Who of those you should vote for? Well, that's left to you. Though we can ensure you that this year, once again, there are lots of motivated candidates for you to choose from.

Student Self-Administration

The German law regarding universities gives the student body the right to independently organise themselves and to elect their own representation. In this case the student body includes both all students immatriculated at RWTH Aachen University and different kinds of committees and structures. During their studies all students come into contact with some of the student body's structures, e.g. student ticket, freshman week, study room information, cultural events like poetry slams, legal consultation, day care centres, ... and many more projects every year.

All students may vote for the **Students' Parliament**. The Representation of Foreign Students is elected by all immatriculated students at RWTH Aachen University who are either foreign or stateless. Depending on your major you may also vote for your **student association**.

Many other posts and commissions are proposed and elected by the members of the Students' Parliament. Thus your vote has an effect on a lot beyond the Students' Parliament.

Students' Parliament

The Students' Parliament (SP) is the highest legislative body within the student body. It decides on the statute and on further supplementing rules that affect every student's life in many aspects. An example is the 'Beitragsordnung' that defines the amount and usage of the fees you have to pay each term. The parliament can also, in order to address the public or some politicians, pass motions which represent the opinion of the student body on certain topics. Its most important task is the election and monitoring of the AStA. Furthermore it can and does support student initiatives with subsidies and conditional guarantees.

AStA

The Student Union (AStA) is the highest executive body within the student body. It represents the students' interests towards the University, the federal state of North Rhine-Westphalia, and the general public. Furthermore, its responsibilities include the administration of the budget of the student body, advising services on social and student-relevant topics, organisation of cultural events, and political education.

Some select examples of the AStA's services are: Notarisations, free legal advice for students, refund of the student ticket. Additionally the AStA supports student initiatives with their formation and with networking. It is also responsible for negotiating contracts, such as the one for the semester ticket, on behalf of the Students' Parliament.

Representation of Foreign Students

The Representation of Foreign Students (AV) is an additional body similar to the Student Parliament. It is elected by all immatriculated students at RWTH Aachen University who are either foreign or stateless. Its purpose is the representation of non-German students and their interest within and beyond the University. Its most important task is the election and monitoring of the Foreigner Representation Office.

The Foreigner Representation Office is often used interchangeably with the Representation of Foreign Students. Therefore the German abbreviation 'AV' is the same. Legally speaking the Office is an executive body responsible for all foreign or stateless students with offers, for example: Legal advice regarding aliens law, language courses and other trainings.

Student Associations

A student association ('Fachschaft') is a subset of all students studying the same or one of several connected subjects. Each student association represents the subject-specific interests of its students, organises the freshmen week, supports the student representative in various committees (like the examinations board) and advises its students. Lots of student associations furthermore offer services such as access to practise exams from previous years or bargain deals by bulk-buying subject-specific study materials (gowns, stethoscopes, craft materials, ...).

Each student association is a bit different. Only some are elected together with the Students' Parliament during the election week. This year the Representation of the Student Associations of Civil Engineering, Mechanical Engineering, Business and Economics, and Medicine as well as the Council of the Student Associations of Geosciences and Georesources will be elected together with the Students' Parliament and the Representation of Foreign Students in the election week. For further information it's best to consult the website of your 'Fachschaft' or to take a look at the student association's applicant's page a bit further back.

Academic Self-Administration

Generally speaking, in Germany universities administer themselves. Each state has a legal framework. State governments and university administrations regularly meet up to formulate common objectives. Everything else is decided locally by the university members in many different committees. In all parts of the academic self-administration four groups are normally represented: professors, scientific staff, non-scientific staff and students. In almost all cases the group of the professors holds the absolute majority.

The **senat** elects the rectorate and decides on many different overarching regulations. This includes the site rules and the framework for exam regulations.

For every faculty there is also the **faculty council**. The faculty councils elect the deans and decide on regulations local to their faculty. Among those are the individual exam regulations for all of RWTH's study programs. They define requirements for admission, structure and examination details.

The students you elect into the **senat** and the faculty councils in turn elect the student representatives in many more commissions like the examination boards.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)

Question: Academic self-administration, student self-administration, what is all this?

Answer: Briefly said: The academic self-administration is the central administration of our University. Here students are allowed to participate in decisions but are not allowed to decide on their own, e. g. on exam regulations. Student self-administration includes all decisions the student body and its representatives (all students) can make on their own, e. g. everything regarding the student ticket.

Question: Why would I care?

Answer: Some of the things, which were adjusted recently, are: Registration periods for exams, regulations on medical certificates if you miss your exam, enrolment, free attempts for exams, structure and content of many study programs.

In case you are not only enrolled to have a student ticket, you are in touch with academic committees with each class and exam you take.

Question: Is it even possible for students to make a difference if the professors have the majority of votes?

Answer: In Aachen the student representatives are eminently respected by professors and University employees. Their voices are listened to and taken seriously. In case of the Senate, if the students are overruled, it is their right to veto on decisions. Additionally decisions that directly affect students (like exam regulations) usually have to pass commissions where students have half of the votes.

Question: That sounds interesting. How can I join?

Answer: As mentioned the Senate and the Faculty Council are just two (or ten, depending on how you decide to count) of dozens of committees that exist at our University. However they are the only two that are up for election. Later in the year, students members for all the remaining commissions will have to be found and elected. If you are interested, just ask your current Senate members (**senat@gremien.rwth-aachen.de**), your student association or take a look at the website of your faculty.

Question: I have an urgent problem with one of my exams, some criticism or feedback. To whom should I talk to?

Answer: Your student association is your first and best address for most questions regarding your academic life. If they don't know the answer to your question, they will guard you to someone who does. Your student senators can be reached via the email address above. Usually the AStA has a department for teaching which will help you out (**lehre@asta.rwth-aachen.de**). All three will help you with your concerns on your studies.

More Information?

You want to know what's going on in a bit more detail? Then you can do some online-research, ask members of the various groups or take a look at the AStA's book on university politics ('HoPo'-Reader). Take note though that the book is only available in German. (<https://asta.ac/hopo-reader>)

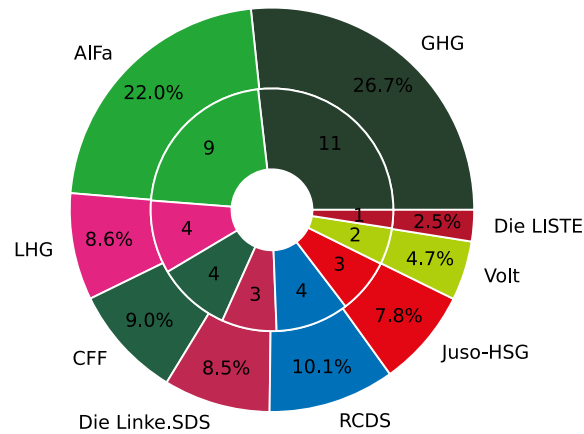

Review of the Electoral Year 2023

Last year nine different groups ran for the election to the 71st Students' Parliament. During the last election 4351 out of 43,353 eligible voters went to the polls. The turnout of the election was 10.04 %. Out of all voters, 1,135 voted for the „Grüne Hochschulgruppe“ (GHG), 937 voted for the „Allgemeine Fachschaftsliste“ (AlFa), 364 voted for the „Liberale Hochschulgruppe Aachen“ (LHG), 385 voted for the „Campus For

Future“ (CFF), 363 voted for the „Sozialistisch-Demokratischer Studierendenverband“ (Die Linke.SDS), 430 voted for the „Ring Christlich-Demokratischer Studenten“ (RCDS), 333 voted for the „Juso-Hochschulgruppe Aachen“ (Juso-HSG), 202 voted for the „Volt Hochspannungsgruppe“ (Volt), and 107 voted for the „Die LISTE - Hochschulgruppe der PARTEI“ (Die LISTE).

Our Goals

What do we stand for?

Sustainability, social justice, and equality are our core values that we consider in every decision.

Our goal is an inclusive academic environment and full participation in university life for students. Therefore, we firmly **oppose any form of discrimination!**

For us, university life extends far beyond mere academics: **cultural events and involvement** in student initiatives are also integral.

We aim to further develop the RWTH as a whole. This includes making our university environmentally friendly, **achieving climate neutrality by 2030.**

We are **well connected** at the municipal, federal, and state levels, advocating for our goals and engaging with relevant stakeholders.

Sustainable RWTH!

The RWTH has committed to the **1.5°C target** and achieving climate neutrality by 2030 in its sustainability policy. To achieve this, we demand greater authority for the RWTH Sustainability Office!

Sustainability must be considered in every area and decision of our university. It's not about appearances but about real change. This can only be achieved with **effective measures and participatory formats.**

Examples include **digitizing heating systems**, ending the renovation status with the goal of climate-neutral buildings, and equipping RWTH buildings with **photovoltaic systems.**

Modern and interdisciplinary teaching!

As an elite university, RWTH serves as a role model for many other institutions. Accordingly, **sustainability and interdisciplinarity** must also be prioritized in teaching. A modern, high-quality education entails not only contemporary topics but also a **balance between theory and practice** in all programs. Student engagement is part of this practice: every curriculum should offer the **opportunity to academically recognize involvement.**

Our goal is also to expand the **free trial rule** to the first three subject semesters. Currently, students who change their subject late are disadvantaged by this as the rule only applies to the first three university semesters.

Within the framework of academic independence, we demand more **transparency** regarding collaborations and external funding that influence teaching. Students have the right to know what external resources are flowing into departments

Green and affordable Mensa!

We can't avoid the topic of Mensa this year either. We are calling for a more **nutritious vegan and vegetarian menu** that will keep you full. We also want to encourage more vegan dishes and soups to be offered, with the meat side dish as an additional option rather than as standard. Every student should continue to have the opportunity to have an inexpensive, warm meal every day. That's why we continue to campaign for the affordability of meals in the Mensa.

A roof over your head is not a luxury!

The housing situation in Aachen is particularly difficult for students - there is a severe shortage of affordable accommodation. We are calling for more living space and **keeping places in student residences affordable**. In addition, sustainability and climate justice must be taken into account in new buildings and renovations.

Local transport for night owls!

As students, we rely on buses and trains every day. This doesn't change at night either: there must be more **bus connections after 10 pm**, so that we can get home after the university library has closed. At the same time our **semester ticket** must remain socially fair and affordable.

One university for everyone: diverse, tolerant, respectful!

Internationality and diversity characterize our campus. To ensure that this remains the case, we are committed to **dismantling discriminatory structures** and establishing better mechanisms.

Lecturers and students should be able to deal with diversity issues as easily as possible and thus reflect on their own **subconscious prejudices**. Discrimination is not part of teaching, everyday university life or research and it takes a willingness to change and an **open culture of error** to tackle this problem. To this end, we need to strengthen **anti-discrimination offices** and structures.

Equal rights and anti-discrimination are not marginal issues, but should be **actively integrated** into decision-making processes.

Socially just BAföG!

Social organizations, political parties, and student unions have been demanding **comprehensive reform of the BAföG** for years. While the government has announced reforms, current drafts are very disappointing.

The reform includes a study start-up aid, an additional flexibility semester, and an extended possibility for changing majors. However, significant points are conspicuously absent: the basic rates have not been increased. This is concerning, especially since the last adjustment was made in

2022, and an **increase is urgently needed** due to inflation and rising rents. The study start-up aid is paid out too late, realistically too little, and a single flexibility semester is insufficient as many degree programs require more than one additional semester.

Also missing is the **regional adjustment of the rate for housing costs**, which structurally disadvantages students in cities with high rental prices.

Our demands are clear: We continue to advocate for a **parent-independent BAföG**, regular adjustments of basic rates and allowances, and the regional adjustment of the rate for housing costs. This way, BAföG can finally bring justice where it is needed!

Strengthen and recognize volunteer work!

Volunteering is an integral part of student life and should therefore be considered in every curriculum.

Volunteering students not only gain **valuable practical experience** but also make a significant contribution to campus life. Therefore, they should have the **opportunity to earn credit points** for their volunteer work.

Additionally, they should be provided with facilities - as spaces for networking, learning, and shaping, as well as meeting points for minorities.

Improve Learning spaces!

It is particularly difficult to find a suitable study room during the lecture period. We are committed to ensuring that there is a good power supply in the study rooms and that more study rooms stay **open longer**.

We are also calling for more quiet rooms and more study **rooms for groups**, as well as outdoor study areas that can be used in good weather and are close to water dispensers.

Help, hole in the ceiling!

Many buildings at our university have high energy consumption and are **in need of renovation**. These renovations are being delayed. We want to support to ensure that the most effective measures are initiated as soon as possible. At the same time, we are leveraging our contacts in state politics so that funding for all major renovations becomes available sooner rather than later.

As part of the renovations, it's important to ensure that buildings are **accessible to everyone**. This especially includes providing **barrier-free access and all-gender toilets**.

More sport, less costs!

The **opening hours** of the RWTH Gym are not sufficiently **compatible with the everyday life** of many students. We want to seek discussions with the HSZ and work intensively on a joint solution.

We are also calling for greater support for the HSZ from the university in order to enable **lower participation fees**, especially for financially disadvantaged students.

Student Engagement

Without the **student councils within faculties** as well as the **student initiatives** and their commitment, nothing would work at the university. At the same time, this commitment is completely voluntary and unpaid. Nevertheless, we student representatives want to give something back: Further **training** and thus safety. It is time for the AStA to rethink the existing concept of "student council training" to adapt it to the needs of the student councils and to expand it with **professional training**.

Security through professionalization is particularly needed in the areas of **awareness**, first aid, **anti-racism training** and communication skills.

No savings should be made there. Awareness concepts must not be limited to cultural events.

In general, we rely on an **appreciative approach** in our cooperation with the student councils from our offices - after all, we know where our roots are and, like no one else, what student council work means and where the AStA would be without the commitment of student council members. It's time to restore the good relationship between the AStA and the student councils!



University politics, nothing more and nothing less - for a student parliament free of party-political ideologies!

In addition to the work of the student councils, student involvement in **associations and initiatives** is essential for exchange and development on campus and in Aachen itself. The initiatives often face financial and organizational challenges, including **storage space** and legal advice. In these cases, the university must introduce funding opportunities, if the diverse and international landscape of initiatives is to continue. The interaction between old and new volunteers is the basis for a flourishing volunteer program, but there is a lack of **new people**.

Therefore, commitment must become more attractive through **appreciation and CP**.

Furthermore, the **diverse landscape of initiatives** is currently tackling technical, social and cultural problems.

We are committed to preserving, promoting, and harnessing diverse perspectives as a catalyst for change. Our vision is to establish a **collaborative network platform** for student engagement, where common topics and issues will be discussed to generate actionable tasks for the AStA's engagement team. Project leaders will lead working groups in partnership with representatives from various sectors to drive the development and promotion of engagement in Aachen. The results will inform future network meetings, ensuring continuous expansion and deepening of our impact. **Dear initiatives and associations, let's unite to create powerful synergies!**

Culture & Campus Life

In recent years, there have been significant developments in terms of utilizing campus space for student cultural activities. We are thrilled to see that **Templergraben** and **Platanenplatz** have transformed into vibrant venues for hosting a diverse range of student events, including cultural performances, art exhibitions, and social gatherings. However, we also recognize the untapped potential of other areas on campus, such as the **Talbot parking lot**, which could be repurposed to accommodate more cultural and artistic activities. Our commitment is to continue our efforts in making these spaces not only usable but also easily accessible for organizing student cultural events. In addition to enhancing campus spaces, we strongly believe that **student culture should extend beyond the confines of the campus**. Therefore, we are actively seeking and promoting close collaborations with the city of Aachen to establish **further cultural spaces**, enabling students to engage with the broader community and contribute to the cultural landscape of the city.

Student initiatives contribute a large part to the student cultural offerings at RWTH. We know from our own experience that financing events can sometimes be very difficult. With a **cultural fund** that offers financial support for cultural events, the realisation of some event ideas could be simplified and the cultural offer in general could grow. This would make it possible for free or more complex events to take place.



For cultural events even beyond the campus borders!

The RWTH prides itself on being a diverse and international university, with approximately 31% of its students coming from around the world. This underscores the importance of expanding the AStA's **English-language cultural program and political education (PoBi)**. Furthermore, there is a clear opportunity to diversify the formats for PoBi, allowing for more engaging and impactful educational experiences beyond traditional panel discussions.

At the same time, we see a need for a greater variety of formats: **PoBi can do more than just panel discussions!**

The **Aula 2**, which was used as a rehearsal room for **musical initiatives**, has been closed for several years by now.

Due to the closure, these initiatives had to move to other rooms. We are therefore calling for Aula 2 to be reopened and for further RWTH rooms to be made available for music.

Social

The vital support provided by **proRWTH** for students in financial crises has been a lifesaver for a huge amount of them in recent years. This program, initiated by us in 2020, is an essential lifeline that must be sustained. With the costs of living on the rise, **BAföG** no longer meets the needs of students, and there is no indication of an improvement. As representatives of the student body and AStA, it is our duty to advocate for the student perspective in politics and to push for expedited processing by the StW.

Education

Teaching must be a place **free from discrimination** for all students! To achieve this, we must expand our training program on **preventing discrimination**. We also need to enhance the visibility of the university's reporting offices and establish a **central platform** for reporting incidents of discrimination.

Students come from diverse backgrounds, and not all can attend events in person. It's crucial to motivate lecturers to make course materials available digitally. The university should create a platform and methodology that fosters a **culture of open and accessible learning**.

Working as a student assistant provides valuable exposure to research and teaching. However, the **pay is often insufficient to cover living expenses**. It's essential to ensure that student assistants are fairly compensated and that a Bachelor's degree holds its value.

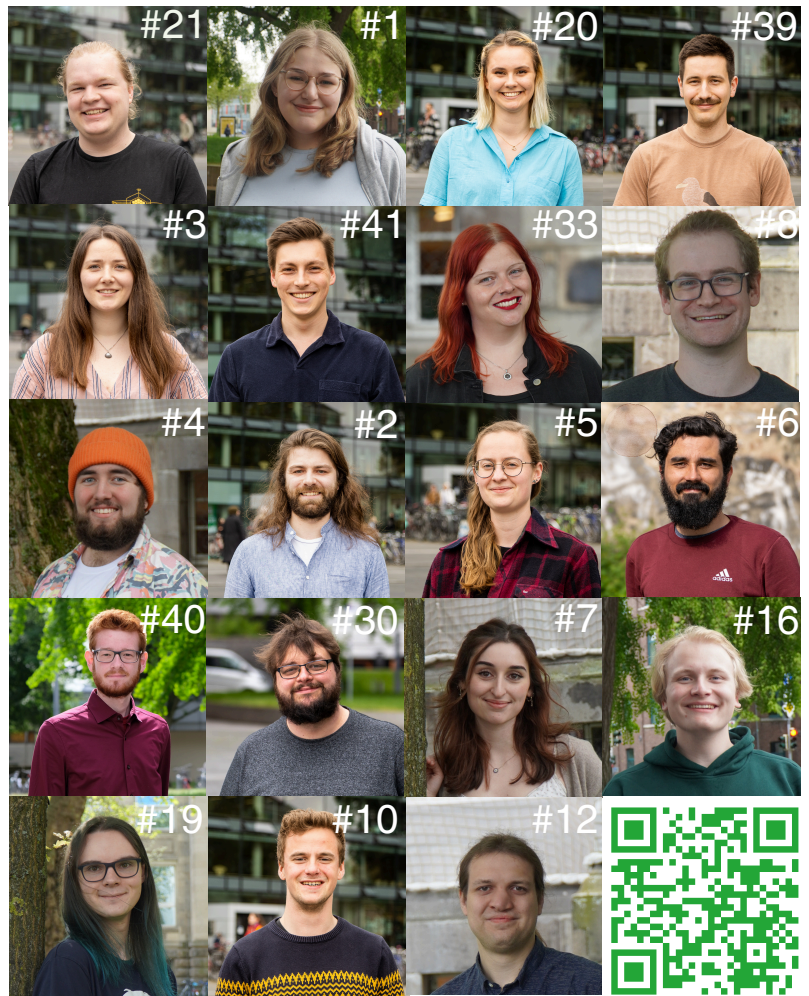
The current regulation of **limited free attempts** places an excessive burden on students. The restriction to new Bachelor's students continues to unfairly pressure Master's students to pass. Relaxing this rule is essential to enable a continuous learning process for students. **Education must be a source of encouragement, not discouragement**. Exams should rigorously assess competencies without unnecessary hardship.

It is crucial that the RWTH is not associated with high exam failure rates.

Examinations, particularly the Dynexite exams, must unequivocally focus on **assessing competencies**.

They must be competence-oriented and aimed at improving the quality of learning spaces.

The current supply of **learning rooms** does not meet the requirements; more group work rooms and small rooms for participation in digital events are needed.

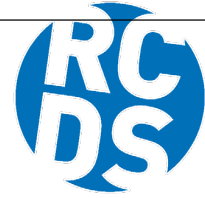

The coming years are decisive for democracy in Germany. At the RWTH, the student body should make a greater contribution to political education. We therefore demand that the AStA, university radio and groups organize more political education events.

more modern studyrooms

The much-heralded study room building on Campus West will not be built after all. The problem of high capacity utilization and low availability of modern learning spaces persists. RWTH should make existing areas (e.g. Sparkassenforum) increasingly available as learning spaces.

E-Learning

A university the size of RWTH needs to provide a strong digital offering to complement the on-campus offerings. This would not only make studying more flexible, but also more accessible and fairer, as not everyone can concentrate best in the lecture hall.

Demand more Open-Source at our University!

RWTH uses closed source programs in teaching, such as Siemens NX (CAD), which students have to buy themselves, although there are good free alternatives. Where these alternatives are not available, the licenses should be made available to students by RWTH.

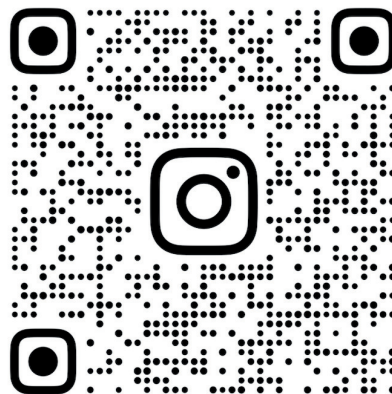
Imagine everyone went to the lectures.

RWTH is already excellent in research. In our opinion, however, this is too much at the expense of excellent teaching. While research professorships are already dedicated exclusively to research, teaching professorships should be created that focus entirely on teaching. The synergies between research and teaching are strong in more specialized courses, internships and other courses with small group sizes, but rare in basic courses. Irrespective of a far-reaching reform in this sense, existing systems such as the junior professorship should be used to a greater extent at RWTH.

Fair Credits

Credit points are currently very difficult to obtain between and within degree programs. Fair credits are crucial for equal opportunities in studies. A transparent system for credit points makes the course of study easier for everyone.

RWTH should make greater use of its potential in the development of environmentally friendly technologies. As a leading technical university, it can play a pioneering role in the development and application of environmentally friendly innovations in order to meet the global challenges of climate change.

affordable mensa

Healthy and nutritious food has a very positive effect on our performance. However, for this to be possible for all students on campus, the canteens must fulfill the following criteria: They must be available. This includes longer opening hours and the possibility of getting food without having to wait in line for a long time. They must remain affordable, because if students cannot afford the food in the canteen despite the subsidy, it will not reach exactly where it is needed most. They need good food, because potato pockets with potatoes drag down their reputation, and rightly so.

Semester-fee and transparency-culture

Our contributions must be handled with care. Expenditure in the student body must be in proportion to the benefits. However, in order to be able to judge this at all, the expenditure must be transparent in the first place. However, this is not the case for expenditure under €200. Inquiries from students requesting information on this expenditure were ignored or not answered in a meaningful way. The resulting impression is clear: transparency was simply not wanted here.

Startups at the Uni

The RWTH is to become the engine of start-up creation. Existing networks such as the Collective Incubator can be expanded or supplemented. In addition, certain subjects that deal with founding and managing start-ups should be dropped or credited for successful founders.

Many students are employed as student workers and often do not know their employment rights. As a result, they do not use their vacation entitlement and do not receive sick pay. Furthermore, they are in particularly precarious employment relationships due to their frequent dependence on professors and permanent fixed-

term contracts. We want to fight this with a collective agreement for student workers and support the nation-wide TV Stud-campaign. Better working conditions at the university also increase the pressure for better working conditions outside!

- > Digital follow-up of courses must be made possible
- > Alternative event directory for events organized by students
- > Offer Kurdish language courses at the language center
- > More interdisciplinary lectures and courses
- > Strengthening and expansion of the language course offer through higher recognition and promotion
- > Embed abortion education in the curriculum
- > Possibility to borrow hardware
- > Gender specific medical research

SUSTAINABILITY

Climate is the issue of the century and an inherently social one. If we want to reach our climate goals we need to act radically and immediately. The RWTH claims to be an „Exzellenzuniversität“, but lags behind many other universities in terms of sustainabil-

ity. That needs to change! Unfortunately, the past has shown that even in the StuPa sustainability issues do not find majorities. Therefore, the only answer can only be a strong left in the student parliament! Climate justice is only possible with the left!

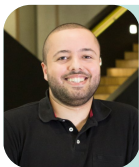

Sustainability

Social University & Study Financing




The increase in the cost of living, rising rents and ancillary costs are making life at university difficult for many students. We are forced to seek financing options that can prolong our studies. As a result, many students fall into a cycle of building up debt to cover living costs. We therefore call for a fair approach to student financing: a revision of the current 29th amendment of the BAföG is essential. Only by adjusting the amount of funding can BAföG provide fair and social financing. Through our network in federal politics, we are fighting for student funding that lives up to its name!

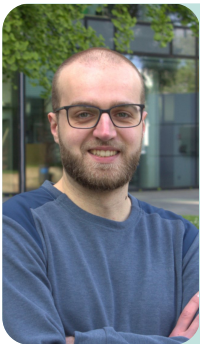
Many students are dependent on a part-time job to finance their studies. Unfortunately, the wage collective bargaining concluded last year have hardly improved the situation of student employees. A collective agreement (TV Stud) is needed for good working conditions. In order to raise the visibility of the position of student employees, we are calling for stronger cooperation between the student body and trade unions.

We are also fighting to improve the situation of students locally: In recent years, for example, we have worked energetically with and within the AStA's social department to help students in need. We have also campaigned for a significant increase in funding for social loans and for reimbursement of the mobility contribution in order to further match the demand so that all students can receive the support they need.

We also helped push through the Freitisch program, which means that students in financial emergencies don't have to worry as much about getting a hot meal. In many situations, good advice can help solve these problems. We will therefore continue to strengthen the AStA's social counseling service and draw more attention to these services. The demand for psychological counseling has also increased significantly during the pandemic. The RWTH's psychological counseling service was already working at full capacity beforehand. Too few positions must not be a reason for inadequate psychological support for students.

-  **Expansion and maintenance of the social assistance of the AStA**
-  **Better psychological counseling**

Student Housing

Good & Critical Teaching

The aim of an academic education cannot only be to educate the perfect worker. A degree must also convey interdisciplinary skills and critical thinking. We are committed to a Studium Generale, which offers an interdisciplinary overview of different subjects and offers the possibility of a wide-ranging orientation. In addition, we require historical, ethical and social science modules to be mandatory in all courses. Even those who study engineering, medicine or natural sciences later bear social responsibility. It is important to learn from history and to be able to reflect critically on one's own work. In all subjects, anti-fascism and feminism must be basic consens and must be considered in one's own actions.

Exam stress paired with mental and financial stress are not a basis for a good degree. Therefore we demand an end to the limited examination attempts towards a study without constraints, the final failure should be abolished! The standard period of study must also be suspended in order to enable a self-determined course of study. This also includes the abolition of mandatory attendance in all areas of university. This not only makes access to academic education unnecessarily difficult, but also the benefit of mandatory attendance is questionable.


Good teaching also includes good organization and planning. Lecturers who change their timetables at short notice or modules for which the dates are only known a few days before the start make the course more difficult, especially for those who work alongside their studies, look after children, care for relatives or are otherwise involved.

Good teaching also means appropriate material and staff. There are far too few staff in teaching. In busy lectures in particular, there are often a few employees for hundreds of students. There can no longer be any talk of appropriate and sufficient care.

The situation is also particularly bad when it comes to learning spaces: learning and lecture rooms are rarely prepared for the requirements of digital or hybrid teaching, and there is a lack of power sockets and PCs. This should not be the case! We are therefore campaigning at university level, but also through our contacts in state and federal politics, for better funding for studies, more rooms with better and future-proof equipment and more teaching staff.

In 2015, the RWTH wrote a civil clause into its basic regulations as a voluntary commitment. However, this clause is formulated so vaguely that research can continue to be conducted for military purposes, as was the case, for example, with the so-called Machbarkeitsstudie from 2016. If RWTH Aachen University wants to live up to its social responsibility, it needs a genuine civil clause that explicitly stipulates the research objective of "civil and peaceful goals".

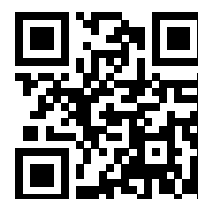

Taylor's recipe corner: Taylor Swift Chai Sugar Cookies

Ingredients: 1/2 Cup Butter, 1/2 Cup Oil, 1/2 Cup Sugar, 1/2 Cup Little Sugar, 1 1/2 TL Ingwer, 1 TL Zimt, 1/4 TL Kardamom, 1/8 TL Nelken, Little Pfeffer, 1 Egg, 2 TL Vanilleextract, 2 Cup Mehl, 3/4 TL Natron, 1/2 TL Salt and Zimtsugar.

For Glaze: 1/12 Cups Little Sugar, 1/4 TL Ground Nutmeg, 3 TL Milk

Zubereitung: Preheat oven to 350 F and prepare baking paper. Beat the butter in a large bowl for about a minute. Add the vegetable oil and then mix in the sugar and spices. Stir in the egg and vanilla extract until well combined. Add the flour, bicarbonate of soda and salt and stir at low speed or with a wooden spoon. Chill the dough for an hour in the fridge or 15 minutes in the freezer.

Form large balls. Roll the dough balls in cinnamon sugar and bake the large cookies for 12-14 minutes or the small ones for 8-10 minutes. Let the cookies cool on the sheet for 10 minutes, then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely. Prepare a glaze and spread over the cooled cookies, leaving the edges free. Sprinkle with a little nutmeg and store the cookies in an airtight container for up to 4 days.

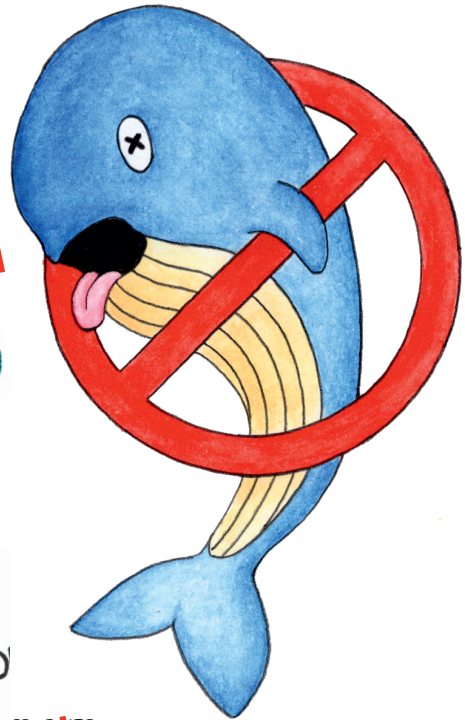

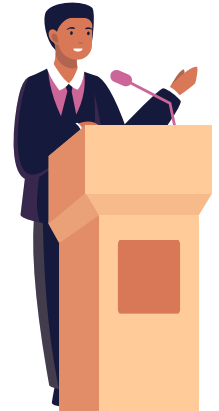

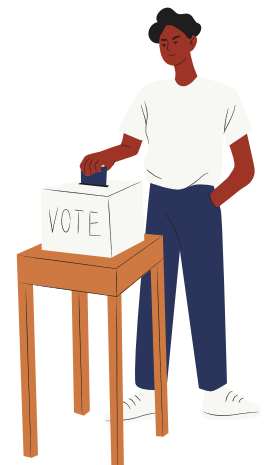
Who are the „Funktionalen“?

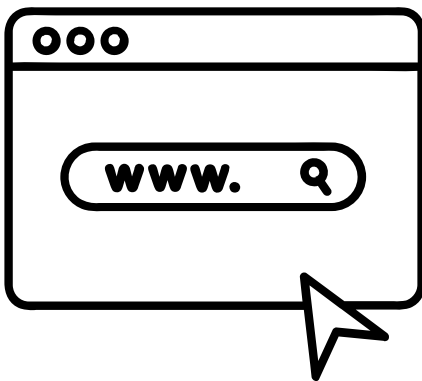




What are we committing?

International Representation

In the last legislative period, only one of the **41** available **seats** was held by an **international** student. Considering that a significant proportion, about **31.88%**, of our students are **international**, we believe it is urgently **necessary** to increase the **international representation** in our university's parliament.



IT-Service

Our university still has **weaknesses** in daily IT services. A particularly important example would be **Eduroam**, our **Wi-Fi** network. Our goal is to solve such problems and eliminate minor frustrations in everyday life so that all students can **work** and **learn smoothly**.

Klassiker in the Mensa-Bistro

A few months ago, the **Mensa Bistro stopped** serving **classic** dishes. This decision also led to **long queues** at the Mensa Academica. While we **respect** the dietary choices of **vegan** and **vegetarian** students, we believe that food **options** should **not be restricted**.

All students should have **access** to the **affordable menu** in the Mensa **all day** long. Therefore, we believe that both Mensas near study areas (**Academica** and **Bistro**) should serve **classic** and **vegetarian** dishes from 11 am **to 6 pm**. This is particularly important during the **exam period**.

It is also important that the Mensas are **no longer closed due to holidays** or **illness**.

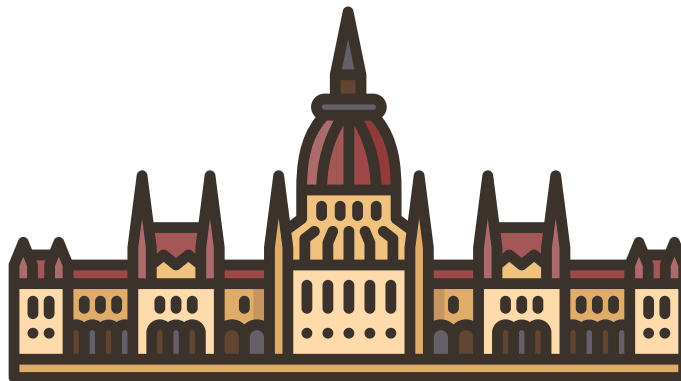


Study Spaces

Another goal of ours is to create more study spaces for students. Often, it is **impossible** to find a **place** in our university **library**.

One possible reason for this could be that individuals who are not enrolled at our university have access to the library. We plan to **restrict access** to the library to **students only**.

Other possible measures include identifying potential study spaces on campus and making them accessible for learning, **reopening closed study spaces**, and regularly **monitoring** the **current study spaces**.
