


# Die Wahlen in 90 Sekunden!

**Warum soll ich wählen?** Weil Jahr um Jahr hunderte Studierende sich in den verschiedensten Ecken der Hochschule engagieren und dein Studium verbessern. Wer will kann jederzeit mitmachen! Wer sich selbst nicht dazu berufen fühlt, hat einmal im Jahr die Chance mit minimalem Aufwand mitzuwirken und mitzuentcheiden, was im kommenden Jahr auf der Agenda steht: Durchs Wählen!

**Wie kann ich wählen?** Wählen kannst du online während der Wahlwochen auf (<https://onlinewahlen.zhv.rwth-aachen.de>) oder per Briefwahl (<https://asta.ac/wahl-brief>). Dabei kannst du deine Stimme auf verschieden Stimmzetteln abgeben: Auf weißen Stimmzetteln für die akademische Selbstverwaltung. Ein- bis dreimal auf farbigen Stimmzetteln für die studentische Selbstverwaltung.

**Wen soll ich wählen?** Dazu gibt es keine einfache Antwort. In dieser Wahlzeitung finden sich allerdings Vorstellungen (fast) aller zur Wahl stehenden Listen und Personen. Wen du davon wählst, bleibt dir überlassen. Wir können aber versichern, dass auch dieses Jahr wieder zahlreiche motivierte Studierende kandidieren.

## The elections explained in 90 seconds!

**Why should I vote?** Because year after year, hundreds of students get involved in various areas of the university and work to improve your studies. Anyone who wants to can join in at any time! And for those who don't feel called to get involved themselves, there's one chance each year to participate and help shape what's on the agenda for the coming year — by voting!

**How can I vote?** You can vote online during the election weeks at <https://onlinewahlen.zhv.rwth-aachen.de> or by mail at <https://asta.ac/wahl-brief>. You can cast your vote on different ballots: On white ballots for academic self-governance. One to three times on colored ballots for student self-governance.

**Who should I vote for?** There's no simple answer to that. However, this election newspaper includes introductions to (almost) all the lists and candidates running for election. Who you choose to vote for is entirely up to you. But we can assure you that once again this year, many motivated students are running for office.

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# Student Self-Administration

The German law regarding universities gives the student body the right to independently organise themselves and to elect their own representation. In this case the student body includes both all students immatriculated at RWTH Aachen University and different kinds of committees and structures. During their studies all students come into contact with some of the student body's structures, e.g. student ticket, freshman week, study room information, cultural events like poetry slams, legal consultation, day care centres, ... and many more projects every year.

All students may vote for the **Students' Parliament**. The Representation of Foreign Students is elected by all immatriculated students at RWTH Aachen University who are either foreign or stateless. Depending on your major you may also vote for your **student association**.

Many other posts and commissions are proposed and elected by the members of the Students' Parliament. Thus your vote has an effect on a lot beyond the Students' Parliament.

## Students' Parliament

The Students' Parliament (SP) ist the highest legislative body within the student body. It decides on the statute and on further supplementing rules that effect every student's life in many aspects. An example is the 'Beitragsordnung' that defines the amount and usage of the fees you have to pay each term. The parliament can also, in order to address the public or some politicians, pass motions which represent the opinion of the student body on certain topics. Its most important task is the election and monitoring of the AStA. Furthermore it can and does support student initiatives with subsidies and conditional guarantees.

## AStA

The Student Union (AStA) is the highest executive body within the student body. It represents the students' interests towards the University, the federal state of North Rhine-Westphalia, and the general public. Furthermore, its responsibilities include the administration of the budget of the student body, advising services on social and student-relevant topics, organisation of cultural events, and political education.

Some select examples of the AStA's services are: Notarisations, free legal advice for students, refund of the student ticket. Additionally the AStA supports student initiatives with their formation and with networking. It is also responsible for negotiating contracts, such as the one for the semester ticket, on behalf of the Students' Parliament.

## Representation of Foreign Students

The Representation of Foreign Students (AV) is an additional body similar to the Student Parliament. It is elected by all immatriculated students at RWTH Aachen University who are either foreign or stateless. Its purpose is the representation of non-German students and their interest within and beyond the University. Its most important task is the election and monitoring of the Foreigner Representation Office.

The Foreigner Representation Office is often used interchangeably with the Representation of Foreign Students. Therefore the German abbreviation 'AV' is the same. Legally speaking the Office is an executive body responsible for all foreign or stateless students with offers, for example: Legal advice regarding aliens law, language courses and other trainings.

## Student Associations

A student association ('Fachschaft') is a subset of all students studying the same or one of several connected subjects. Each student association represents the subject-specific interests of its students, organises the freshmen week, supports the student representative in various committees (like the examinations board) and advises its students. Lots of student associations furthermore offer services such as access to practise exams from previous years or bargain deals by bulk-buying subject-specific study materials (gowns, stethoscopes, craft materials, ...).

Each student association is a bit different. Only some are elected together with the Students' Parliament during the election week. This year the Representation of the Student Associations of Civil Engineering, Mechanical Engineering, Business and Economics, and Medicine as well as the Council of the Student Associations of Geosciences and Georesources will be elected together with the Students' Parliament and the Representation of Foreign Students in the election week. For further information it's best to consult the website of your 'Fachschaft' or to take a look at the student association's applicant's page a bit further back.

# Academic Self-Administration

Generally speaking, in Germany universities administer themselves. Each state has a legal framework. State governments and university administrations regularly meet up to formulate common objectives. Everything else is decided locally by the university members in many different committees. In all parts of the academic self-administration four groups are normally represented: professors, scientific staff, non-scientific staff and students. In almost all cases the group of the professors holds the absolute majority.

The **senat** elects the rectorate and decides on many different overarching regulations. This includes the site rules and the framework for exam regulations.

For every faculty there is also the **faculty council**. The faculty councils elect the deans and decide on regulations local to their faculty. Among those are the individual exam regulations for all of RWTH's study programs. They define requirements for admission, structure and examination details.

The students you elect into the senate and the faculty councils in turn elect the student representatives in many more commissions like the examination boards.

## Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)

**Question:** Academic self-administration, student self-administration, what is all this?

**Answer:** Briefly said: The academic self-administration is the central administration of our University. Here students are allowed to participate in decisions but are not allowed to decide on their own, e. g. on exam regulations. Student self-administration includes all decisions the student body and its representatives (all students) can make on their own, e. g. everything regarding the student ticket.

**Question:** Why would I care?

**Answer:** Some of the things, which were adjusted recently, are: Registration periods for exams, regulations on medical certificates if you miss your exam, enrolment, free attempts for exams, structure and content of many study programs.

In case you are not only enrolled to have a student ticket, you are in touch with academic committees with each class and exam you take.

**Question:** Is it even possible for students to make a difference if the professors have the majority of votes?

**Answer:** In Aachen the student representatives are eminently respected by professors and University employees. Their voices are listened to and taken seriously. In case of the Senate, if the students are overruled, it is their right to veto on decisions. Additionally decisions that directly affect students (like exam regulations) usually have to pass commissions where students have half of the votes.

**Question:** That sounds interesting. How can I join?

**Answer:** As mentioned the Senate and the Faculty Council are just two (or ten, depending on how you decide to count) of dozens of committees that exist at our University. However they are the only two that are up for election. Later in the year, students members for all the remaining commissions will have to be found and elected. If you are interested, just ask your current Senate members ([senat@gremien.rwth-aachen.de](mailto:senat@gremien.rwth-aachen.de)), your student association or take a look at the website of your faculty.

**Question:** I have an urgent problem with one of my exams, some criticism or feedback. To whom should I talk to?

**Answer:** Your student association is your first and best address for most questions regarding your academic life. If they don't know the answer to your question, they will guard you to someone who does. Your student senators can be reached via the email address above. Usually the AStA has a department for teaching which will help you out ([lehre@asta.rwth-aachen.de](mailto:lehre@asta.rwth-aachen.de)). All three will help you with your concerns on your studies.



# Review of the Electoral Year 2024

Last year nine different groups ran for the election to the 72th Students' Parliament. During the last election 7469 out of 41,415 eligible voters went to the polls. The turnout of the election was 18.03 %. Out of all voters, 2677 voted for the „Grüne Hochschulgruppe“ (GHG), 1316 voted for the „Allgemeine Fachschaftsliste“ (AlFa), 669 voted for the „Sozialistisch-Demokratische Studierendenverband“ (Die Links.SDS), 290 voted for the „Sozialistisch-Demokratischer Studierendenver-

band“ (Die Linke.SDS), 505 voted „Volt 伏特 - die Pommes Mafia und Piraten - Alemannia Fans - Karpfenkommando - Männer, lol“ (Volt), 504 voted for the „Juso-Hochschulgruppe Aachen“ (Juso-HSG), 475 voted for „Ring Christlich-Demokratischer Studenten“ (RCDS), 440 for the „Liberale Hochschulgruppe“ (LHG) 314 voted for the „Liste der Funktionalen“ (FUNK), and 170 voted for the „Die LISTE - Hochschulgruppe der PARTEI“ (Die LISTE).

Such change is only possible with effective measures and by involving all university groups in transparent, participatory processes.

Concrete steps include digitalizing the heating infrastructure, ending the “renovation status” to create climate-neutral buildings, and installing solar panels on RWTH rooftops across campus.

### ***Safe student mobility***

Students are out and about day and night, in any weather. Cycling to campus shouldn't be life-threatening—what's needed is a clearly marked, safe network of bike lanes, especially around university buildings.

For the busy Wüllnerstraße bike route, there must be a safe alternative during the ongoing construction.

Between lectures, bikes need weather protection too. That's why we want more covered bike parking spots, for example near the Mensa and SuperC.

## ***No tuition fees for Internationals***

RWTH is planning to introduce tuition fees for international students. We strongly oppose this. Education should not depend on your parents' income or how much money you have.

The proposal is another blow to students already facing racism, working side jobs, or living at the edge of financial survival.

Even with promised scholarships or hardship rules, tuition fees would mean the end of studies for many internationals. We cannot allow that to happen.

## ***Excellent teaching***

Excellence should not be limited to research. For us, excellent, modern teaching means: interdisciplinary approaches, practical relevance, taking course evaluations seriously, and having the courage to innovate. Teaching must be transparent and independent—we want to know what kinds of partnerships are shaping content and teaching.

For many students, being involved in

initiatives is part of university life. Every degree program should make space for that through credit points. We also call for an extension of the free-attempt regulation to the first three semesters of your course of study, so changing your subject doesn't put you at a disadvantage.

### ***BAföG. Independent. Reliable. Enough.***

BAföG must also be automatically and regularly adjusted to inflation.

We want BAföG to be independent of parents' income—this way, fewer students fall through the cracks and less bureaucracy means faster processing times.

## Student Fees? – No Way!

**Clear Rejection:** We firmly oppose all forms of tuition fees, especially the ones proposed by the university administration for non-EU international students. Introducing such fees would disproportionately burden a group already affected by discriminatory structures and would further normalize shifting the costs of essential public responsibilities onto individuals.

**Taking Action against Student Fees:** Public pressure and political advocacy are not mutually exclusive – they reinforce each other. The decision to allow RWTH to introduce such fees ultimately lies with the state of North Rhine-Westphalia. Together with other universities, we will campaign against tuition fees on a state-wide level. At the same time, we're engaging directly with lawmakers to push for rejection and advocate for a formal hearing in the state parliament's science committee.

## Studying must not be a luxury

**BaföG - Independent from Parents, Secure, Accesible:** About one third of students live in poverty, yet only 12% receive BaföG. Focused studying or volunteer work is barely possible under the weight of financial insecurity. We call for a parent-independent, livelihood-securing, and bureaucracy-free BaföG - and we advocate for this locally with Aachen representatives and nationally alongside other student bodies.

**Expanding Affordable Housing:** Housing is the largest expense for students, and affordable options are scarce. New student dormitories often fail not because of a lack of funding, but due to a shortage of available land. The AStA must push the city to designate more inner-city space specifically for student housing.

**Lower barriers to Support Services:** The AStA offers a wide range of services to improve students' social conditions. Social loans and counseling services are vital tools. We aim to make them more visible and reduce barriers to access, particularly around scheduling.

**Professional Help in Mental Crises:** Following the model of legal counseling, we want to introduce professional psychological support to help students facing acute mental health challenges.



## Effective and meaningful teaching

**No Tutorials Without Student Assistants:** Tutorials are essential for understanding course content. Their key advantage lies in the peer-to-peer approach, where experienced students act as tutors to explain material in an approachable and relatable way. These student assistant positions were previously funded largely through the quality improvement funds (QVM) provided by the state of North Rhine-Westphalia. A recent legal change severely limited this funding. This decision must be reversed to ensure manageable tutorial sizes and better support for students!

**A Study Space is More Than a Chair and Table:** Many students do not have a quiet place to study at home and rely on accessible learning spaces. Central locations like the Couven Hall and Sparkassenforum must be available as learning areas. We also advocate for innovative concepts such as open-air study spaces. To support healthy study habits, we call for more break areas with proper amenities.

**Flexibility in Studying:** There are recurring efforts to structure degree programs more rigidly, pressuring students to take difficult exams earlier. While we acknowledge the issue, we oppose such coercive approaches. Instead, we advocate for incentives – such as greater promotion of the free exam attempt regulation or allowing grade drops for early exam participation.

**The Exam Regulations Are Not Just a Suggestion:** Student rights too often remain theoretical. Many students are unaware of the free attempt policy or their right to view their own graded exams. For these rights to be truly accessible, better communication and education from the university and AStA are essential!

## No room for Discrimination!

**Accessibility is not a "nice to have":** People with disabilities have a right to full and equal participation. That's why RWTH must remove physical barriers in its buildings, integrate the fundamentals of accessibility into all curricula, and reintroduce sign language courses.

**No Cuts to Counseling Services:** RWTH's advisory and reporting offices are essential support structures and must not fall victim to budget cuts.

**Raise awareness:** The AStA's gender equality project and anti-racism office do important work through workshops, lectures, and information campaigns. These efforts need to be promoted more effectively by the AStA to reach a wider audience.

**No discrimination in restrooms:** Going to the bathroom should be a given, but unfortunately, it isn't for everyone. We advocate for the expansion of unisex toilets and the free provision of menstrual products.

## Greater recognition for engagement

**Create space for engagement:** The student association house at Augustinerbach has been a temporary solution for ten years now. This transitional state must finally come to an end so that the affected student councils have proper spaces, where everyone can feel welcome. At the same time, storage space for student initiatives is becoming increasingly scarce. The AStA is committed to actively addressing this issue.

**Increase visibility:** The diversity of student initiatives at RWTH is still too little known. Online advertising mostly reaches those already active and does not reflect the full range of engagement. Using analog media and forming partnerships with smaller groups can improve public visibility. Better outreach will also help recruit new members, ensuring that existing initiatives continue with fresh ideas and new people.

**Volunteer certificate:** Volunteering helps students develop many valuable skills. This should be officially recognized so that volunteer work not only enriches student life but also provides real value beyond the university.



## Green campus instead of concrete jungle

**Strengthen bicycle infrastructure:** Bicycles can replace cars, but only if there are more and better parking facilities that encourage use. Fixed air pumps and the campus bike repair workshop are already well received and should be expanded.

**Make public transport attractive:** The outer parts of the university and Aachen are poorly connected by public transport. As the largest customer and an important partner of ASEAG, we must use our voice. Better connections would also make new areas more viable for student housing.

**Water – drinkable and free:** In many university buildings, the tap water is not drinkable. Installing or reactivating water dispensers would significantly improve study conditions, especially during the summer.

**Integrate sustainability into the curriculum:** The importance of sustainability must be addressed in a hands-on way across all degree programs.

## Strengthen student culture

**Awareness – more than just a buzzword:** At student events, everyone should feel safe and welcome. Developing and implementing awareness concepts requires resources and expertise. The AStA should support this with advice and trained personnel.

**Fair access to university sports:** Slot allocation shouldn't depend on luck or internet speed. We want to work with the university sports center (HSZ) to find new solutions. While the numerous renovations and upgrades at the HSZ are necessary, communication must be improved to increase acceptance.

**Culture needs space:** The university has many rooms that could be used for events. Unfortunately, booking them is complicated and heavily limited by building closing times. This creates major obstacles for organizers. We call for simpler processes and longer opening hours to give student culture space - even in the evenings.

**Respect religious holidays:** The current exam scheduling is based solely on Christian holidays. Students of other faiths are required to take exams on their most important religious days. This is neither fair nor in keeping with the times. Scheduling must reflect the religious and cultural diversity of the student body.

**Relieve bureaucratic burdens:** Whoever organizes events must comply with regulations. Be it noise protection assessments or insurance policies. The AStA can centrally gather information and obtain expert reports for similarly used areas.

## Act, don't just talk

**Presence:** In the past legislative term, the student parliament was often unable to make decisions because too few representatives from other lists showed up. Agendas had to be changed at short notice and motions postponed. This is not only inefficient but also disrespectful to the voters and the people submitting motions. The parliament must become reliably functional again!

### Cybersecurity risks of electronic elections and the recommendation for postal voting

**Digitalization** does not stop at democratic processes. Electronic voting systems are supposed to make elections more efficient, but they harbor considerable **cyber security risks** 🛡️.

1. **High attack surface:** electronic voting systems consist of many IT components - each potentially vulnerable (e.g. through DDoS, MitM, malware) ⚠️ 💻.
2. **Lack of transparency:** While analog elections are public and traceable, digital election processes remain a black box for many. Even with certifications or audit trails, there is a lack of real traceability 🕒.
3. **Difficult verifiability:** A central principle of democratic elections is the possibility of independent verification. With digital procedures, this so-called “verifiability” is often technically complex and not intuitively comprehensible 🔍 ✖️.
4. **Dependence on providers:** private operators create conflicts of interest - there is no independent control 🤝 🏢.

### Fazit

Digital elections may seem modern, but they harbor considerable risks for security and confidentiality. The risk of manipulation, lack of transparency and technical complexity are at odds with the basic principles of democratic elections. Under these conditions, postal voting is currently the more robust and trustworthy option ✉️ ✓





## Social university & student financing

The increase in the cost of living, rising rents and ancillary costs are making life at university more difficult for many students. They are forced to seek financing options that can prolong their studies. We are therefore calling for a fair approach to student financing: a revision of the 29th amendment to the BAföG Act from last year is essential. Only by adjusting the requirement rates can BAföG provide fair and social funding. Through our networking in federal politics, we are fighting for student funding that lives up to its name!

Many students are dependent on a part-time job to finance their studies. Unfortunately, the wage negotiations concluded last year have hardly improved the situation of student employees. A collective agreement is needed for good working conditions. In order to make the position of student employees better heard, we are calling for stronger cooperation between the student body and trade unions.

We are also fighting to improve the situation of students locally: In recent years, for example, we have worked energetically with and within the AStA's social department to help students in need. We have also campaigned for the pot for social loans and for reimbursements of the mobility contribution to be significantly increased and further adapted to the need in order to provide all students with the necessary support.

We also helped push through the Freitisch program, which means that students in financial emergencies don't have to worry as much about a hot meal. In many situations, good advice can help solve these problems. We will therefore continue to strengthen the AStA's social counseling service and draw more attention to these services. The demand for psychological counseling has also increased significantly during the pandemic. The RWTH's psychological counseling service was already working at full capacity beforehand. Too few positions should not be a reason for inadequate psychological support for students.

## A clear NO to tuition fees

The university's plan to introduce fees of 3,000 to 5,000 euros for international students from non-EU countries jeopardizes the diversity and inclusion that our university prides itself on. With these plans, RWTH risks creating an environment in which only students from wealthy families will be able to afford to study at RWTH. RWTH's international reputation will suffer as a result. Talented people from all over the world are excluded and Germany's ability to attract specialists and future professionals dwindles.

Our list is firmly opposed to tuition fees in any form. We will fight against this in the student parliament and campaign at state level to ensure that the state government does not give the Rector the opportunity to introduce tuition fees. We will also actively support initiatives and student organizations that are campaigning against these high fees. Our university offers us many opportunities and possibilities. We will continue to fight to ensure that all students, regardless of their background, have access to these opportunities.







## Good education means critical education

Good education means first and foremost adequate material and sufficient staff. If there are only a few lecturers for hundreds of students, there can no longer be any question of appropriate and sufficient supervision. We are therefore calling for better funding and organization of teaching so that lecturers no longer have to put teaching on the back burner to their other obligations at their respective institutes.

Good organization of teaching also includes predictability. Lecturers who change their timetables at short notice or modules for which you only find out the dates a few days before the start make studying more difficult, especially for those who work alongside their studies, look after children, care for relatives or are otherwise involved.

The situation is also particularly bad when it comes to learning spaces: learning and event rooms are rarely prepared for the requirements of digital or hybrid teaching, and there is a lack of power sockets and PCs. This is not acceptable! We are therefore also campaigning for the existing rooms to be better equipped and for the number of learning spaces to be increased.




Exam stress coupled with mental and financial strain are not the basis for a good course of study. We are therefore calling for an end to the limited number of examination attempts and the abolition of final failures! The standard period of study must also be suspended to allow students to determine their own course of study. This also includes the abolition of compulsory attendance in all areas of university teaching, as this makes access to academic education unnecessarily difficult.

The aim of an academic education cannot just be to train the perfect employee. A degree course must also teach interdisciplinary skills and critical thinking. We advocate compulsory historical, ethical and social science modules in all degree courses. After all, even those who study engineering, medicine or a natural science have a social responsibility. It is important to learn from history and to be able to reflect critically on one's own activities. Anti-fascism and feminism must be a basic consensus in all subjects and must be taken into account in one's own actions.

### We demand:

- **An end to limited examination attempts, compulsory attendance and standard periods of study**
- **More teaching staff and rooms that are fit for the 21st century**
- **Civil and peaceful research goals for a genuine civil clause**





## DIGITALISATION

Digitalisation is of utmost importance for a university that aims to finally arrive in the 21st century. In the past, our education officer initiated a project lead for Digital Teaching and the RWTH App within AStA, bringing much-needed attention to the topic within student self-governance. Building on this success, we now call for the establishment of a Vice-Rectorate for Digitalisation! Its mission must be to make RWTH's teaching and administrative processes more digital—and thus more efficient.

### RWTH APP AS OPEN SOURCE

Unfortunately, not all the features of the earlier version of the app have been re-integrated. We are campaigning for the return of functionalities such as the Study Space Traffic Light (Lernraumampel). Moreover, every student at this technical university should have the opportunity to help shape the app collaboratively. That's why we want to turn the app into an open-source project!

### OPEN SOURCE IN TEACHING

RWTH still relies on closed-source software in teaching—software that students often have to purchase themselves, even though high-quality free alternatives exist. We are calling for a greater use of open-source software in education, as a matter of principle.

### LEVERAGING THE POTENTIAL OF DIGITALISATION

We advocate for a critical evaluation of digital teaching formats, their improvement, and their continuation wherever they make sense, alongside the use of in-person teaching wherever it provides a clear benefit. Only through such a hybrid approach to teaching can students be granted true academic freedom.

### UNIVERSITY-OWNED STREAMING PLATFORM

During the 2022/23 term, our education officer initiated the development of a university-owned streaming platform. This platform aims to encourage more faculty members to make recordings of their courses available in the long term. As the LHG, we are committed to this project and will work to ensure that future AStA administrations pursue it actively and effectively!

### ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE (AI)

AI skills are becoming increasingly important. That's why we demand the integration of AI literacy training into university teaching. Furthermore, we call for clear guidelines on how AI tools may be used in term papers and final theses.

### Paperless University

At last, students can now submit their final theses digitally at RWTH. The next step must be to allow the digital submission of term papers as well. This would not only reduce the financial burden of studying but also allow RWTH to make a positive contribution to sustainability. We fully support the abolition of paper submissions for term papers!





## TEACHING

University studies must better reflect the everyday realities of students. This is especially true for working students and single parents, who need the flexibility to plan their studies around their lives. The university can support this by leveraging digital opportunities, making lecture recordings widely available, and embracing its role as a digitally-present university.

### FAIR CREDITS

For us, excellent teaching means proper student support from the university and no overload during exam periods. The LHG therefore advocates for fair credit allocation for all modules. We believe it's unacceptable for students to put in significant work without receiving proper recognition!

### MAKING RWTH STUDIABLE

We call for the option to complete voluntary, but grade-relevant coursework throughout the semester. These contributions should count towards final exam grades in advance, helping to reduce pressure during exam season and allowing students to achieve better outcomes.

### STRENGTHENING TEACHING SKILLS

In faculty hiring processes, decisions are still too heavily weighted towards research output and publication records, while the quality of teaching samples is often neglected. At a university of excellence, teaching must no longer be treated as a side job—it must stand at least on equal footing with research. That's why we demand mandatory didactic training for all newly hired instructors at RWTH.

### REWARDING DILIGENCE & ENCOURAGING SUCCESS

The LHG advocates for giving all students the opportunity to retake a passed exam once in order to improve their grade. This would support academic ambition and help students reach their full potential.

## INTERNATIONAL

DRWTH is a university known worldwide. That's why we advocate for expanding RWTH Aachen's international partnerships and increasing the number of global cooperation agreements! In addition, the recognition process for academic achievements abroad should be simplified to make international mobility more accessible.

### ENABLING STUDY ABROAD

We believe that every degree program should include a dedicated mobility window for studying abroad. Exams and modules must be scheduled in a way that allows students to take full advantage of this time for an international experience.

### AN OPEN AND WELCOMING CAMPUS

To help international students feel at home on campus, we call for an increase in English-language cultural and political events. It's important to us that everyone feels welcome and included at our university.

### FREE LANGUAGE COURSES

Currently, German courses at RWTH come with fees. Instead of putting up unnecessary barriers, all language courses should be free for international students to support integration and academic success.

## FINANCES

Studying often comes with individual financial constraints. That's why we pay close attention to the responsible use of student body funds. You can count on us: there will be no reckless increases in the semester fee. We ensure that your money is spent wisely and transparently!

### PARENT-INDEPENDENT BAFÖG

We want to use our voice at RWTH to advocate for a parent-independent BAFÖG system in Germany. Our university must take a clear and public stand on this issue!

## STUDENT ENGAGEMENT

We are convinced that the creative potential of our students must be actively supported. That's why we are calling for the creation of a funding pool for student initiatives to financially support innovative projects.

At the same time, we want to strengthen entrepreneurship by expanding advisory services, reducing bureaucratic hurdles, and improving access to industry. RWTH and the AStA should establish dedicated support centers to make this possible.

## CAMPUS

Overcrowded study spaces are a constant issue at RWTH Aachen. That's why we call on the university to provide more study spaces during exam periods. For example, the Sparkassenforum should finally be made available again as a student workspace!

### MORE DIVERSE STUDY ENVIRONMENTS

When creating new study areas, attention should be paid to innovative concepts and variety. We specifically advocate for the creation of group workspaces and study rooms equipped with access to simulation software.

### A CAMPUS WORTH LIVING (AND LOVING)

A campus worth living on needs green spaces. That's why we're calling in particular for the greening of the Talbot parking lot and its use as an event space for students.

## UNIVERSITY SPORTS

To make sure students don't have to constantly hit the "refresh" button during lectures just to get a spot in a sports course, we are calling for the implementation of a weighted lottery system for course allocation. The current system's lack of flexibility is no longer acceptable!

### SUPPORTING LOCAL PARTNERSHIPS

In our view, the University Sports Center (HSZ) should expand its cooperation with local sports clubs in Aachen. This would allow RWTH to bring in new and especially qualified trainers, while also increasing the overall capacity of university sports offerings.

The LHG also supports the idea of a university-wide survey to identify which additional sports and courses students would like to see offered at RWTH.

## MOBILITY

The campus should be accessible from all directions — that's why we call for an increase in public transport services to the university. In addition to expanding capacity, greater reliability is also essential.

### SECURE BICYCLE PARKING

We advocate for better cycling infrastructure and call for the expansion of bicycle parking facilities at university buildings. To improve both comfort and safety, these parking areas should be monitored around the clock.

### OUR MOBILITY GUARANTEE



## Our Vision

Our goal is to represent and express common sense in a political environment that has become increasingly polarized. We do **not identify as left or right**. We are a group of **friends** who came **together to bring change** to the **stagnant structure of** our student **parliament**.



1) To **defend** student interests – by advocating for fair policies, **accessible education**, and a **better university** experience for all students.

2) To bring **international representation to** the student **parliament** – by ensuring the voices and concerns of international students are heard and addressed.

## Last Year's Highlights

In January, **we submitted** a joint proposal—together **with all other lists** in the Student Parliament—**against tuition fees**. It passed unanimously. **We are active members of** the platform **Students Against Fees**. **We** have been **protesting, gathering signatures**, connecting SAF with the international student initiatives at RWTH and ASTA. In other words **fighting** in many ways **against** the tuition **fees** that are planned for international students who are not EU citizens.



We have been actively suffering from the **lines in front of the library** and have been **trying** to find a **solution** for it. **We** have been **encouraging** the **opening** of **new** learning **rooms** and the **exclusive access** for the students **of our university**. We know that it should not be so hard to just have a place to study and we acknowledge it as one of the main problems of our student body. **We** are going to **work** with our minds and hearts to **solve this** issue this year as well.



Mensa Tour

We have also been working to make our Mensa more inclusive. Unfortunately, changes have been made to our favorite meal option—Klassiker. **While** all **other** meal **options** are **available** from **11:30 to 18:00**, the **Classic** is **only** offered from **11:30 to 14:30** and has been **removed from** the **Mensa Bistro**, which is located in the heart of our campus.



Despite these limitations, **Klassiker** remains the most popular option—chosen by 44.71% of students in 2022 and by 55% in 2023 (out of six options). These numbers show two things:

**1)** Students prefer the Classic despite its shorter availability.

**2)** The **limitations placed** on it have not changed student habits—suggesting that **these changes** are **more** of a **political** gesture **than** a **practical** improvement.



SAF Protest in StuPa

We have been actively advocating for international representation in the student parliament. **We** are the **only primarily international** list in the parliament and have worked hard to **represent** the interests of **international students**. We regularly meet with student initiatives, listen to their concerns, and bring their issues to parliament.

## Goals for This Year

### Culture Pass

Aachen has many **museums** and **cultural spaces** worth exploring. **We want** to introduce a Culture Pass that would **give students** free or **discounted entry** to these institutions.





### Psychological Support For International Students

Our university is certainly one of the most difficult universities in Europe. **Our university should offer free psychological support in their own language to its foreign students** who are geographically distant and much populated (e.g. Chinese, Indian, Turkish, Arabic, etc.). **Unfortunately, our university is in the process of charging additional fees to foreign students**, who make up more than a third of the student body, instead of offering such support. :(







# Volt is back!

## And we're bringing fresh momentum to the student parliament!

After four years, Volt is once again on the ballot – and we're excited to be running in a new constellation for the student parliament at RWTH and FH Aachen.

As a pan-European, progressive, and pragmatic student group, we combine clear values with solution-oriented action. We draw inspiration from ideas across Europe, think in networks – and are committed to shaping student life in a fairer, more sustainable, and future-ready way.

Whether mobility, the cafeteria, housing, mental health, or digital learning: our goal is to put students' perspectives at the center – and work together with student councils, initiatives, and all of you to create real improvements.

In the following sections, we present our ideas – clear, constructive, and close to campus. Because Volt is more than a name: it stands for energy, cooperation, and change.

## Mobility – Europe starts at the bus stop

With the introduction of the "Deutschlandticket" for 29.40€/month, students finally have access to an affordable, nationwide transit pass. We say: this must stay – affordable, accessible, and with even more potential.

Especially in Aachen, located in the border triangle, cross-border mobility is key. The extension of the semester ticket to South Limburg (NL) was a big step.

Now we want more: **a direct link to Liège (BE) via the RE18 line.**

What we want to achieve in the StuPa:

- Advocate for keeping the Deutschlandticket under student control
- Support and amplify efforts to extend the ticket into Belgium
- Push for better bike infrastructure on campus: safe parking, rental systems, clear routes
- Apply pressure against ticket price increases without student input

**Cafeteria – Sustainable. Transparent. For everyone.**

The cafeteria is more than a place to eat – it's a social space and an important part of daily student life. That's why we believe it should work well for everyone: fairly, sustainably, and transparently.

We're committed to expanding vegetarian and vegan options – not just in what's offered, but in how it's organized. In places like Mensa Academica, where lines and systems are often confusing (vegans and vegetarians, you know what we mean), clearer structures would benefit everyone: shorter lines, smoother flow, happier diners.

Transparency matters too: we want clear labeling of ingredients, allergens, and nutritional info – both online and on-site.

What we want to achieve in the StuPa:

- Push for more plant-based and regional meals through dialogue with the Studierendenwerk
- Keep the Relevo reusable system free of charge, even after the planned 18ct fee starting June 2025
- We call for single-use packaging to be fully replaced with reusable alternatives – using incentive systems instead of extra charges.

**BAföG – Fair student financing now**

Education shouldn't depend on your bank balance – but for many students, it does. In Aachen, BAföG rates barely cover rent for a shared flat, and only a small portion of students receive any support at all.

We call for a BAföG system that reflects real living costs – with higher base rates, realistic income thresholds, and access that doesn't depend on your parents.

What we want to achieve in the StuPa:

- Expand and promote BAföG advising services at RWTH and FH
- Advocate for low-barrier, peer-run information points
- Build pressure via position papers and cooperation with other universities
- Create visibility through platforms where students can share their experiences

**Students & the City – shaping Aachen together**

Aachen isn't just where we study – it's where we live. Many decisions that affect us day-to-day – from housing to transit – are made at the city level.

We want to actively engage with the city and bring student perspectives into local politics. Beyond the existing roundtable "Politics & Students," we aim to develop ideas with the city council to make student voices more visible – including the potential creation of a permanent student advisory board.

Our conviction: if you study in Aachen, you should have a say in shaping it.

**Mental health – You matter**

Academic life can be intense: exams, financial stress, uncertainty about the future. Many students feel exhausted or overwhelmed, yet mental health is still often treated as a taboo. We believe that must change.

Mental well-being isn't a luxury – it's a foundation for successful studies. That's why we push for concrete improvements – now, not later.

Particularly concerning: some programs don't recognize ADHD as valid grounds for academic accommodations. Navigating the system is often opaque, requiring insider knowledge or connections. That's unacceptable. Students need access to clear information, straightforward processes, and institutional support – not extra hurdles.

What we want to achieve in the StuPa:

- Expand accessible, peer-friendly mental health counseling at RWTH
- Strengthen group sessions and workshops, and ensure they're well-publicized
- Ensure stable funding and staffing for the Mental Health Center (ZPG)

Our goal is clear: No one should face the challenges of university life alone. We bring mental health into the open – and onto the political agenda.

**Teaching & Digitalization – for students, not the system**

Studying means more than sitting in lectures. We envision a learning environment built around students' realities – with flexibility, responsibility, and modern tools.

Hybrid formats, recorded lectures, and open-access materials should be the norm – especially for students who work, have health conditions, or caregiving responsibilities.

What we want to achieve in the StuPa:

- Push for broad access to digital learning tools and platforms
- Back student councils as the central voice in academic matters, and strengthen their structural role
- Advocate for a more digital administration: easier forms, faster confirmations, fewer paper trails

The StuPa can't control teaching directly – but we can push, support, and give those who can have real momentum.

### **Sustainability – Campus for the future**

Climate action starts right here. We want our universities to lead by example – not just talk about sustainability, but live it. To us, a green campus means: more trees, less concrete. 
Our sustainability goals in the StuPa:




We also want to offer students unforgettable and distinctive experiences by creating many opportunities to make social contacts and integrate into the community.
